

# A Word from the Pastor

#### **Seek Treasures from Heaven**

During the course of this year, we have attempted to put a large measure of focus on a theme or understanding of the process of repentance and allowing ourselves to accept Christ. Our hearts and minds have been encouraged to be filled with a greater measure of His love and a greater level of service and response to this acceptance within ourselves.

The scripture verses Matthew 6:19-21 are common references for discussion involving treasures: "Lay not up for yourselves treasure upon earth, where moth and rust doth corrupt and where thieves break through and steal. But lay up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust doth corrupt and where thieves do not break through nor steal. For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also."

Often times we may find it simple to list our "earthly treasures." The world around us suggests that our treasures are measured by how much monetary value they have. A house, car, toys, bank balances, clothes . . . the list goes on and on. Will all these treasures eventually get rusty, old, fade away, be stolen, or do they have an eternal value as well?

What about these "treasures in heaven" that are mentioned? How do we measure their value and how is it that they can withstand being stolen or getting old, and what makes them so full of worth that they are laid up and stored in heaven for us?

From verse 21 it simply describes to us that whatever has value, monetary or not, this "treasure" is in our hearts and that is where our desires are found. This is perhaps a warning

and a promise! It's a warning that encourages us to examine the desires of our hearts. Our hearts' desires are the "treasures" on which we put such a heavy value in our lives. The promise is perhaps that if we choose treasures of eternal value that they will be preserved for us in heaven for a later time of life.

We are encouraged during the months of July and August to seek treasures from heaven. What treasures can be found in your heart right now? Can they rust or be stolen, or are they treasures that are of eternal value? Establish eternal treasures in your heart: faith in the Lord and His plan of salvation; loving and serving all; charity-filled forgiveness; healthy relationships that testify of God's involvement; preparing a home for Zion; pursuing moments to serve the Lord; reading and understanding the scriptures; being a good steward; accepting the love, mercy, and grace of Almighty God . . . and then testifying of all of that through the actions, words, works, and love in your life!



#### Women's Study Classes — by Pat Chadwick

The current classes for the women of the Restoration really started as a gentle thought which would come into my mind from time to time, mostly in my morning prayer time: "The women of the Restoration need weekly study classes."

At first I just brushed the thought aside. Eventually—as it reoccurred—I thought, "Well yes, that would be a good thing for our women to have access to classes." As the impression became a little stronger I decided to pray that someone or some group would develop material and have classes for our church women. I think the Lord probably had a good laugh over that.

I noticed that more and more often this idea of having classes for the women of the Restoration came into my mind. Not just during my prayer time, but frequently it would just pop into my mind as I went about my daily activities. You may think I'm a little slow, but actually I believe that I was in denial.

One morning—while praying about classes for the women of the church—it became very clear to me that God was calling "me" to do it; to take on this responsibility. It seemed like such a huge task; I felt overwhelmed. I argued with God about it for some time, but His answer was always "I'm calling you to do this." So I struggled and didn't know what to do, because I knew the amount of time it would take and I also felt it was beyond my capabilities. Finally I talked to my good friend Sylvia Powell about my experience and asked her what she thought I should do. Of course she said, "Pat, if God is calling you to do this, then you must move out in faith and do it. I will support.

So I moved out in faith and said "Okay God, I'll do it, but I need your help because I can't do it alone!"

First, I felt impressed to contact the CRE Women's Council to see if they would be interested in supporting classes for the women of the Restoration; and they said they would. The rest is history. We no more than started the classes and Covid hit. Many women have expressed what a blessing it was during the lockdown to have these classes available on livestream. The timing was perfect.

God provided for us and met our every need. Without Him these classes would not be possible. He has put His hand upon these classes and blessed them with His Spirit—blessed our teachers, blessed the work as a whole. I give Him all the honor and glory. These classes are watched by hundreds of our church women across the USA, Australia and even Africa.

Sylvia did support me—during the Covid lock-down and ongoing. She attends classes and does our welcome and devotionals. Don Cutshall and his wife Edie come to support us also. Don always offers our closing prayer. The livestream equipment is run by my husband Hal and also Tammy Griffin. During Covid we taught to an almost empty room, usually just four people in the sanctuary at OGRB; but a presence was there as if the pews were full.

I was happy this past Fall when we were able to open back up and have people attend the classes in person again. We are on summer break now, but the classes will start again September 5, 2023, at 10:00 a.m. A group of women attended in person this past Spring, and we had prayer groups after the classes. Most women seem to prefer livestream. It is convenient, but I would encourage those who are free during the day to take the opportunity to come and partake of the rich Spirit that attends these classes and our prayer groups. They worked very hard to make the campgrounds more functional and look better. We took over 15 truck loads and dumped them behind the upper lake. It was very fulfilling work for the youth and myself. The workers that mow the campgrounds will really appreciate our hard work.

Sunday night during our cabin worship I gave the boys a challenge for the week. Each evening before bed they had to share at least one thing they learned that day, a good thing, a bad thing (there was no bad for the week) and a thankful thing. We had such wonderful talks before bed. These talks even spilled over to our rest period, too. Boys can talk! They did ask me, since I was

behind enemy lines (talked to the GIRLS), if I would tell them what the girls said and thought about them. I told them that if they wanted to know what the girls thought and said . . . then go behind enemy lines!

I felt blessed the entire week. Religion class was very uplifting. The boys shared several great things they learned in some of the other classes, too. They learned some things that made them feel

like they were not alone in their struggles in life as a boy. I had a number of the girls ask me some very good questions—about fasting, Jesus knocking on the door and other questions they had about God.

I can't wait to spend more time at retreats and camps. I truly felt my cup was overflowing with the love of Jesus Christ.





#### Senior High Class at Reunion — by Aaron and April Smith

We had the privilege of having around 25 senior high students during the week of the Central Missouri Restoration Branches (CMRB) Reunion. The theme for the week was "Soldiers of Christ Arise: The Time is Now." We wanted the kids to see that their actions NOW are setting and establishing their eternal reward in the future, so the time is NOW to prepare to meet God.

On Day 1 we focused on agency and probation. Day 2 was about what happens at death and how the spirits go back to God and the body returns to the dust. The spirits are then sent to a holding place—either Paradise or Hell/Prison/Pit—depending on how you spent your time on earth. Day 3 was about the different resurrections, who and when. We also spoke of Christ's mission to Hell and why he went there. On Day 4, we covered the principle of eternal judgment and how it is not just a one-time event.

Finally on **Day 5**, we visited the topic of a different set of rewards based on how people have lived their lives on earth.

During this time, we also had the kids make small wooden clocks. On Thursday night, I [Aaron] was going to put the clocks into their wooden homes.

However, I couldn't find them. They were in a small brown paper bag, but they were nowhere to be found. After searching diligently to no avail, at home, I went back to the campground. No success there either, so

I returned home and April and Blake joined in the search. Again, nothing. At this point I was getting very concerned.

Upon leaving the campground the first time the thought came to me that the only place in our classroom (the

Youth Chapel) that I didn't look was in the trash! So, back to the campground, and we found them all in the trash!

When we located all the clock faces and had cleaned up each bag holding an individual clock inside, it struck me that this was just like Christ. He went to the worst place to find us and reclaim us. He didn't lose any one of us, as His love is so great and will persevere through the elimination of all sin. Only the sons of perdition are cast off forever.

That strong object lesson of Christ embracing the nasty sin in our lives—so He could come and save us—was very moving. I hope it resonates with you as well.


