


Looking Forward

HAM Radio Class — by Becky Ballantyne

A HAM radio class was held Saturday morning, November 18, in the multi-purpose room, down-stairs, at the church. Attendees included two licensed HAM radio operators and another 12 potential HAMs. The class opened with a scripture from Luke 12:50-52 and Bob White offered a prayer. Everyone was using a full featured, albeit complex, hand-held radio.

In the past, we've worked on our radios to access a repeater. A repeater is a device on a tower or high mountain that picks up your signal and repeats it. We've also had classes where we made some antennas, watched PowerPoint presentations on different radios and modes of operations, discussed radio bands, sub-audible tones, and offsets.

This class focused on how to access local "nets" and included an index card hand-out with a list of days, times, frequencies, and a brief explanation of these local nets. "Nets" are groups of HAM operators who get together "on the air." Some nets are formal (specific topics) and others are informal (many topics). The general rule for topics/discussions on the air is that it must be something you would be okay to share with your mom. Anyone, licensed or not, is permitted to LISTEN to nets. However, only licensed HAM operators are permitted to transmit/talk on HAM radio frequencies. Listening to nets helps accustom the user to the way these folks communicate on the air, and get to know each other.

We covered a lot of ground in this class. Jennifer Cool asked a pertinent question: "What is it that we can do right now?" James Bullard suggested we pick a FRS (Family Radio Service) frequency and start working the airwaves now. 462.5625 was chosen as the frequency to use. FRS frequencies are not limited to licensed operators, due to lower power.

FRS does not require a test or license. GMRS (General Mobile Radio Service) requires a license, but no test. HAM radio frequencies require both a test and a license.

The class ended with a closing prayer given by Jeff Cool. Several attendees reported that they communicated with each other all the way home, even with the limitation of low power and pigtail antennas.

This December, members of our congregation jumped in whole-heartedly to participate in the "Adopt a Family" program sponsored by our local Christian crisis pregnancy center, Resource Health.

Resource Health provides free ultrasounds, counseling, parenting classes, and more for women and couples who find themselves pregnant in difficult circumstances. Their main mission is to bring Jesus Christ to these families, as well as to save the lives of unborn babies.

Chosen by Resource Health to put on their "adoption" list were families who had large financial challenges, compounded by their decision to give their babies life.

Our branch adopted two families, and individuals contributed enough money for us to spend the maximum amount of \$500 per family to meet the needs of these families. Between the two families we were able to purchase many items from the families' wish lists and needs lists.

Items we donated included:

- a rocker-glider
- a pack-and-play
- a bedside co-sleeper
- baby blankets and swaddler blankets
- a baby bathtub
- diapers
- other various baby items.

We also purchased warm winter clothing from their needs lists, including a quality work coat for one dad and quality work boots and gloves for the other dad.

Thank you so much to all who participated in sharing the light and love of Christ to these two families! Because of our participation in the Adopta-Family program this year, our usual Starlight collection drive for Resource Health mothers that we have traditionally held in December will be held in January 2024! The Freeze Point — by Susan Freeze

As we start a new year, there should always be a time of reflection. I wanted to share something that played out in my life this year. I started physical therapy this summer. After two months, the therapy had resolved my hip pain.

Right after I finished the therapy, both Flip and I got sick. One or the other of us was sick for about 6 weeks and then I struggled even longer. During that time, I did not do my physical therapy exercises. Soon my pain came back. About that time, I started another round of therapy for a different issue that I was having. Even though there was progress according to the therapist, I didn't really feel the results until about 10 weeks. Then suddenly, I could feel and see results. Next, I started weaving in my first set of exercises to get my hip pain back under control again.

My point is not to share the issues about my body, but rather this realization: without doing the physical therapy exercises <u>REGULARLY</u>, even daily, I couldn't make progress. When I stopped the exercises, my issue came back.

Reflecting back on this whole situation made me see the spiritual connotations. Without regular spiritual nourishment we become spiritually weak. Small changes can bring about great changes. This is a spiritual concept. And thus we see, that by small means, the Lord can bring about great things. 1 Nephi 5:36

I have been reading a book called <u>Atomic Habits</u>, by James Clear. The premise is the same as the scripture: small changes are what make the difference. It is not the big things that we do but the little things that we choose to do every day that make the difference in our life. I have included a few of his quotes below.

"All big things come from small beginnings. The seed of every habit is a single, tiny decision. But as that decision is repeated, a habit sprouts and grows stronger. Roots entrench themselves and branches grow. The task of breaking a bad habit is like uprooting a powerful oak within us. And the task of building a good habit is like cultivating a delicate flower one day at a time."

"Every action you take is a vote for the type of person you wish to become. No single instance will transform your beliefs, but as the votes build up, so does the evidence of your new identity."

"Success is the product of daily habits—not once-in-a-lifetime transformations."

"Your actions reveal how badly you want something. If you keep saying something is a priority but you never act on it, then you don't really want it. It's time to have an honest conversation with yourself. Your actions reveal your true motivations."

Read that last quote again. Your actions reveal how badly you want something. When I don't take time during the week to make regular time with God, I am saying that it (or He) is not a priority. That doesn't make me feel very good when I say it or write it.

The book also talks about steps that help you create habits. He gives good advice. I am looking forward to finishing the book. So far, I recommend it.

I want to make God a priority. The Lord gives us an awesome promise if we seek him. "Behold, I stand at the door, and knock; if any man hear my voice, and open the door, I will come in to him, and will sup with him, and he with me." (Revelation 3:20) Wow! I want to eat with the Lord. I want to feast with him.

OGRB Town Hall — by Eric English

On the evening of December 10th, the Pastorate and the Building Committee hosted a "town hall" meeting to provide an update on basement renovations and to give the congregation an opportunity to discuss what we might tackle next.

The basement bathrooms are now completed. (If you haven't seen them yet, take time to walk downstairs and view them.) This was Phase I of the remaining basement program.

The Building Committee presented a draft design of the rear parking lot (Phase II) along with the approximate costs. There were many questions asked, along with good discussion about the other remaining phases to complete (multipurpose room and kitchen), not to mention some additional ideas about other things that

could be done with the property. This included additional ministry opportunities that the branch could possibly undertake.

Many in the branch were interested in understanding more details about the remainder of the basement phases and costs before deciding to move forward with the parking lot expansion. The Building Committee took this as a homework assignment to begin working on, in addition to completing the parking lot design and getting firm price quotes for the work.

Several concerns were also shared regarding the upstairs kitchen and issues with some of the current appliances. The Committee will be working on a renovation program to make our current kitchen more functional (including modernization and upgrading of all of the appliances).
